

## The Lauths: A Family on a Mission





In the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg, shoemaker Michael Lauth and wife Margaret raised ten children in the village of Bous, near the bend of the Moselle River. Six of those children found a new home at Notre Dame and St. Mary's as members of the Congregation of Holy Cross; a seventh was an alumnus of the University and active supporter of the Congregation. The family served on many assignments together and became an important force in the pioneering efforts of the order in the 1870's through the turn of the century in the United States. Peter would be first to come to America, proving to be the tip of the spear in the migration of his family and many other Luxembourgers, who were known to make excellent priests as they were gifted linguists with the ability to serve a variety of ethnic communities. Through recruiting trips, Peter and John Bernardus would be instruments that paved the way for young men and women to join Holy Cross. Nearly one quarter of the priests and seminarians Fr. Sorin documented in his 1885 circular letters were from Luxembourg.2 The stories of Peter Lauth and his siblings shed light on what mission life was like for the congregation during these important pioneering years and the important role that Luxembourgers played in it.

Peter Lauth was born May 24, 1834 in Bous, the second son of Michael and Margaret. At the age of 20, he left Nassau Germany and sailed across the ocean to America on a two month

voyage arriving on May 5, 1854 in New York. He made his way to Illinois where he was hired as farm laborer for the next several years in Aurora, Little Rock, Plano and at the resident farm of Henry Potter in Somonauk.<sup>3</sup>

While in Illinois he learned English at a small district school, increasing his spoken knowledge of languages to four. In September of 1859, five years after his arrival in America, he attended St. Mary's of the Lake College in Chicago IL. It was there he was introduced to the Holy Cross Congregation. Peter enrolled in the Commercial Course at Notre Dame for the 1861-1862 academic year and graduated with premium awards. He became a postulant of the order in September 1863 and when asked, "What is your Temperament?" he answered, "Somewhat quick!".

Peter was ordained to the Priesthood on March 7th, 1869 at the age of 34. While studying to be a Salvatorist, he also taught German at the college for seven years. His first assignment as priest would be to serve with Fr. Cooney at St. Patrick's in South Bend in 1870. In February of 1871, Fr. Cooney, Fr. Peter and his brother Fr. John preached a successful mission at St.

Bernard's parish in Watertown, WI. The following month, St. Bernards church would be given to the Holy Cross as a mission start.

By 1872, Peter had been in the United states for almost two decades, and would be assigned by Fr. Sorin to return to Luxembourg on business for the community. The Scholastic reported in September that "Rev. Father Peter Lauth is on his way back, with seventeen companions bound for Notre Dame.<sup>12</sup> Among these companions were his siblings, Michael and Catherine, as well as several young men who would become Holy Cross Priests.<sup>13</sup> In October Fr. Sorin wrote to Rev. Ferdinando in Rome, "I am sending back again our Rev. Fr. Lauth...he brought 17 last month."<sup>14</sup>

On the day after Christmas the church of St. Joseph in the town of Lowell, IN burnt to the ground, and the parish community went back to St. Alexis chapel with Fr. Peter as pastor. <sup>15</sup> He would lead that community for the next year and a half, building a two-story structure to serve as both school and church. <sup>16</sup>

In September of 1874, he was sent to serve as President of St. Joseph's College in Cincinnati, OH for 10 months.<sup>17</sup> Over the next several years Fr. Peter moved back and forth between the parishes of St. Joseph, Lowell IN, St. Patrick, South Bend, IN and St. Bernard in Watertown, WI, settling in August 1878 as pastor to St. Patrick's South Bend for the next three years. His parishioners described him as "so devoted to his people that he never took a day off, never took a vacation or rest."

Yet in the midst of this flurry of service, Fr. Peter was not pleased. In August of 1881, he wrote to Fr. Sorin asking for a dispensation. He asked that Fr. Sorin not assign him, or make any calculation on him, as his heart had become alienated from the community. Nevertheless, as he would write later in life, he was next ordered by Fr. Sorin to serve on mission in California. 20

Fr. Peter arrived at St. Turibius Mission, Kelseyville CA in September of 1881, noting that he would have responsibility for the 120 Indians living on the 160 acre farm, as well as four outlying missions. As September turned into October, and the promised help of three sisters, a brother and a fellow priest had not arrived, some frustration started to surface in his letters to Fr. Sorin. He wrote, "I have to see to the calves, cows, pigs, horses and fences just like a farmer." The alienation he felt was expressed to Fr. Sorin, "I can call God to witness that I acted as a faithful member ever since I joined the community, and when I asked you for a dispensation, you

sent me here!"<sup>22</sup> At January's end, help had still not arrived. He confided to Sorin, "I remember distinctly the time when I would die for you... when my soul was as closely united to yours as that of David's to Jonathan's."<sup>23</sup> He bemoaned, "I have not seen a priest since the middle of November; there is no one to whom I can speak a confidential word."<sup>24</sup> A week later at the beginning of February, he wrote a postcard stating simply, "Send help at once!"<sup>25</sup>

Help finally arrived in early Spring, in the form of Fr. Kollop and Brother Clement.<sup>26</sup> There were no more letters of anguish flowing back to Notre Dame; he had begun his journey out of the desert, and by September, he had been transferred to Austin, TX. But he wrote to Fr. Sorin, "Fr. Kollop says he will not stay here alone!" On October 6th, the Holy Cross pulled out of St. Turibius, Kelseyville, CA for good.<sup>28</sup>

Fr. Peter's assignment to St. Mary's Parish in Austin began on September 6th,1882.<sup>29</sup> The building of the new church continued for the first eighteen months of his pastorate; and by the spring of 1884, the church was ready for dedication. The bishop of Galveston decided to hold the event on Low Sunday, which fell on April 20th.<sup>30</sup> Fr. Sorin traveled from Indiana to attend

the ceremony as celebrant; the Lauth brothers, Fr.s John and Jacob, were there to support their brother.<sup>31</sup>

In 1885 he would be assigned as one of five members of the new board at St. Edwards College when the school had incorporated,<sup>32</sup> and by the Summer of 1887 would be teaching himself Spanish at the age of 53.<sup>33</sup> Over the next several years, improvements were made to the church in Austin, including a stain glass window which he donated. He celebrated his Silver Jubilee on March 28, 1894 with many friends surrounding him.<sup>34</sup> When he came to Austin, his parish was small. In 12 years it had grown to be one of the largest in the City. At the age of 60, he was reported to be "in the zenith of his manhood".<sup>35</sup>

In April of 1898, the newly appointed provincial, Rev. John A. Zahm C.S.C., arrived in Austin to make his first visit to St. Edward's College and St. Mary's Congregation.<sup>36</sup> He left nine days later, but following his visit there was a significant change for Fr. Peter: a transfer to Sacred Heart Parish in New Orleans.<sup>37</sup>

In July the Austin Statesman reported, under the banner "Change for New Orleans" that "his promotion comes in good grace, for it is certainly merited." Fr. Peter was much loved and

respected at St. Mary's, where he had served for 16 years. On August 7th he gave his farewell speech. The church was filled to capacity, many turned away at the doors. The heat was excessive; his topic, "With all Thy Soul Honor God and Reverence his Priest", was cut short to a half an hour. By August 14, he celebrated his last marriage, baptism and funeral finalizing his service to St. Marys. That afternoon, his parishioners presented him with a \$100 purse as a token of gratitude; his mission to Austin was finished. 40

Peter served just a year in New Orleans. He next returned to Notre Dame and taught Christian Doctrine for two years. Fr. Toohey noted, Fr. Lauth never tires of expressing his admiration for the excellent spirit of Notre Dame. In 1902, Peter began his last assignment in the parish he had served 30 years prior, finishing his final ministry with a grand 11 year run at St. Joseph's South Bend. His sibling Mary, then Sr. Boniface, began as directress to St. Joseph school in 1903, where she served with her brother for the next 10 years. He resigned as pastor in July of 1913, but continued to work for the church until two months before his death from chronic myocarditis in June of 1916. Peter would say of himself, I never lost the memory of my fatherland, but was an ardent lover of America.

Peter's brother, John Bernardus Lauth, was born on New Year's Day in 1841 in Bous.<sup>47</sup> He came to America in 1859, where he followed his brother to Somonauk, working on the Sylvester property adjacent to Peter's employer.<sup>48</sup> Following the civil war, he went to ND to study and would receive the habit in October of 1867.<sup>49</sup> He also taught German at the college for four years.<sup>50</sup> On November 11th, 1870, he would be ordained by Archbishop Purcell alongside his brother Jacob at Sacred Heart, Notre Dame.<sup>51</sup> Fr. Granger wrote of that event to Jimmy Edwards: "There were three Rev. Lauths on the altar today."<sup>52</sup>

In 1871, Fr. John and his brother Peter preached the first Holy Cross mission in Watertown, WI, and in 1872 was one of the founding priests of the College of Our Lady of Sacred Heart. While there, John mentored his youngest brother Michael, who was studying at the College. In January of 1874, John was called back to Notre Dame to embark on recruitment duties to Luxembourg in search of new postulants for the community. In the middle of May he returned from Luxembourg with eleven recruits ready to study for the religious life at Notre Dame, including nine young women and two young men: a Mr. Johannes, and the future bishop of

Dacca, East Bengal, Peter Hurth.<sup>56</sup> This trip would be the first of several recruitment trips John made to the Grand Duchy during his lifetime. Two days after after Fr. John's return to Notre Dame, Fr. Sorin left for his 1874 Pilgrimage to Europe with handwritten directions from John, describing in detail how to travel from Paris to Luxembourg, and who to visit among the Catholic hierarchy for the purpose of recruitment.<sup>57</sup>

That October, John was sent to Texas to serve as Fr. Spillard's assistant to St. Mary's, Austin, where his sibling Sr. Boniface would serve alongside him at the parochial school.<sup>58</sup>

Four years later, Fr. John would be back in South Bend at St. Patrick's Parish, where he endeared himself to his parishioners, who described him as, "gracious to everyone as well as a good and gentle confessor." By Summer of 1879 he had been reassigned to Watertown, WI, where he acted as advisor to Michael Lauth during a challenging time in his youngest brother's vocation. 60

With the founding of St. Edward's Academy Austin, TX on the Doyle farm in November of 1881, Fr. John would be assigned as new Superior and President by Rev. Louis Le' Etourneau, who wrote, "You will have the satisfaction of being the Founder we may say of the future great

University of Texas." John's Presidency lasted less than a year due to illness. When in July of 1885 the new College of St. Edwards was incorporated, a board was formed of five holy Cross priests: Fr. Sorin, and four Luxembourgers: Fr. John Lauth, Fr. Peter Lauth, Fr. Franciscus (who had been brought over by John Lauth), and Fr. Hurth (who had been brought over by Peter.) 63

While stationed in Taylor, Tx, Fr. John asked Fr. Sorin's permission to return to Bous in May 1886. The newspapers report his departure for Luxembourg, writing "For the last ten years, he has engaged in arduous missionary duties... His zeal for souls, greater than his strength." On his arrival in Bous in July, he penned an update to Fr. Sorin about the "state of affairs in regards to postulants." The following April, he wrote, "I cannot hope to meet with much success, as the clergy of our country are generally opposed to young folks crossing the Atlantic." But in fact, the Ship Waesland left Antwerp, Belgium, three months later with twenty five "young folks" on board bound for South Bend, including Fr. John's Nephew Michael A. Lauth and a niece, soon to become Sr. Genevra, C.S.C. Fr. Sorin, who had gone to recuperate at the Mineral Baths of Mondorf--just a few miles from the Lauth home--wrote back to Notre Dame

that he felt perfectly restored to health, and himself arrived at South Bend just a week after John.

Fr. John readied himself to go back to his duties in Texas, where he served for two more years until late in 1888.

His next assignment, at St. Vincent's parish in Academie, IN, would be one of his most difficult. In a letter to Fr. Hudson, he bemoaned, "I am making my second novitiate." He resigned from St. Vincent's in November of 1890, and by the 29th of that month was on his way back to Luxembourg. The following Summer, while still in the the Grand Duchy, Fr. Sorin again arrived in Luxembourg to visit the healing Baths of Mondorf. Fr. John returned to Notre Dame in early October with his eldest brother, John Lauth Sr. who had come to visit his two children, Mr. Michael A. Lauth CSC and Sr. Genevra Lauth CSC. For the next twenty years, Fr. John lived at Notre Dame, making just one more trip to Luxembourg in 1912. He celebrated his Golden Jubilee in November 1921, where it was noted, "He had a special love for the sick and afflicted". Fr. John passed away eight years later, after a lifetime of struggle with illness, at 88 the oldest of the Holy Cross Lauths.

The third Lauth brother to enter the order was Jacob Franciscus, born on April 14, 1845 in Bous.

When he wrote about his childhood, he described himself as having lived a simple and obedient life, and from the age of twelve to eighteen, drawn to prayer and happy in seclusion.

Jacob immigrated to the United States in June of 1863<sup>79</sup> to attend Notre Dame, where he also joined the congregation of Holy Cross as a postulant. When asked in his Interrogatory what his disposition was, he answered frankly, "Unamiable". Following his graduation, he accepted the habit late in 1867. Like his brothers before him, he would teach Latin and German at the College for the next four years, at the end of which time he and his brother John would be ordained

Following a two month illness in the fall of 1872, <sup>83</sup> Fr. Jacob was sent to St. Joseph's College in Cincinnati as chaplain, where he wrote to Fr. Sorin on Christmas Eve to report over crowded and difficult living conditions. <sup>84</sup> Six weeks later, the congregation purchased an unoccupied mansion adjacent to their college for expansion. <sup>85</sup> By October, Fr. Jacob began to experience significant emotional distress.. While in South Bend, he penned a letter to Fr. Sorin describing his suffering. "I think I am obliged to inform you of my state of mind....No man, except my

confessor, knows how much I suffered in the last three years." He was sent back to Ohio, this time as professor at the College for a short while. By 1875, he was serving as assistant to his brother, Fr. Peter, at St. Joseph Parish in Lowell. That Fall, Jacob went to Watertown WI, and there it became clear he was in severe suffering. He pleaded with Fr. Sorin to be removed at once, stating, "I need immediate relief". It would appear his request was granted, as two weeks later he was co-celebrating mass with Bishop Dwenger at the dedication of St. Patrick's in Chesterton, IN. 88

In 1876, Fr. Jacob would be sent to Austin, TX as assistant pastor at St. Mary's parish alongside his brother Fr. John, where he would serve for the next four years. By October of 1878, he had asked for an exeat from the congregation, and corresponded with the head of the Cistercians at Gethsemani Abbey in Kentucky, where he was refused admittance. When the general chapter met in Neuilly, France in April of 1880, he wrote to the governing council and again asked for his exeat, pleading, "Do not take ill of me when I make a final effort to get out of misery."

Fr. Jacob received his requested leave in the fall of 1880, but asked that his brothers and sisters not be told. <sup>92</sup> The following summer, he was thrown from his carriage and seriously injured, but

survived. There would be no further evidence of his anguish, which perhaps he had conquered. Fr. Jacob stayed the course in the congregation for another fifteen years in Texas, pioneering and founding churches in Granger, Taylor, Caldwell, and Corn Hill. In Galveston, he served the German parish for six years, with his total years of service to the Lone Star State numbered at nineteen. He was well liked by his parishioners as well as his fellow confreres in the Holy Cross, and served with his brothers and sister on numerous assignments in Texas. In 1895, he left Texas for what would be his final assignment for the Holy Cross in Academie, IN.

The following year, Jacob finally took his exeat and was accepted into the Benedictine order in Cullman, Alabama at St. Bernards Abbey, and later assigned as Professor of Moral and Pastoral Theology. Once more he was blessed to serve God with other members of the Lauth family when his two nephews, Fr. Andrew and Fr. John Capesius from Luxembourg, joined the order at St. Bernards, seeing him into his final days and death on August 29, 1915. At Notre Dame it was noted that he had been a priest who had led an exemplary life and was a linguist of marked ability.

Jacob's younger sister Mary was born on July 17, 1848 in Bous as well. She immigrated to the United States in 1866 at the age of seventeen, and entered the congregation in May. <sup>100</sup> She would be given the name Sr. Boniface.

Even though four of her brothers were then at Notre Dame, she was nonetheless lonely for home. Mother Angela Gillespie took the young novice under her wing, and was especially considerate of the homesick girl. Through this relationship, Mother Angela would entrust Sr. Boniface with many worthy assignments over the next several years.

While preparing herself for her final profession, she taught German and French at St. Mary's Academy. The congregation of the Sisters of the Holy Cross received their charter in July of 1869, and in August of that same year Sr. Boniface made her final profession in St. Michael's chapel on the bank of the river, where the Guardian Angel statue now stands. In September, as a newly professed nun, she would be sent on her first pioneering mission to Alexandria, Va where she and five others would open the new St. Mary's parochial school. It was reported that the first few weeks they sat on their trunks and ate their bread and meat without plates or utensils.

In 1874, Mother Angela accepted the request to send some of her sisters to Austin Texas to open a school associated with St. Mary's church. Sr. Boniface would finally be on a mission with one of her siblings, since Fr. John was assigned to help Fr. Spillard at St. Mary's in October of that year. This pioneering venture occupied the next five years of her life. <sup>105</sup>

Still in Texas in 1878, Sr. Boniface would miss the special blessing of the statue of "Our Lady of Luxembourg" at St. Mary's College in South Bend, where the ceremony would be attended by many Luxembourgers. Mother Angela had purchased the statue on her trip to the Grand Duchy in 1876 while on a recruiting trip, guided by Sr. Wigbert Koppes, who had been brought over by Fr. John Lauth. Mother Angela had accredited Notre Dame de Luxembourg with procuring ten postulants for the Sisters of the Holy Cross.

Following her Texas mission, Sr. Boniface would be sent back to Washington, D.C. to teach German at the Holy Cross Academy for four more years. Then she was sent to Indiana where she would start her new pioneering venture in Elkhart IN. Fr. Kroeger requested that the Holy Cross Sisters open a school at St. Vincent's in Elkhart, and Boniface was sent as directress.

Three months after her arrival, her youngest brother Michael would celebrate his first mass at the parish. 111

The next twenty years saw Sr. Boniface teaching in many of the Holy Cross schools in Indiana, and in 1903 she would serve alongside her brother Fr. Peter at St. Joseph's South Bend. In the twilight of her life, she would be assigned as Mistress of the Scholastics for seven years. At the age of 82, her final service to God and her congregation would be to serve her remaining life as hostess to visitors at the Mother House, having had the distinction of being the oldest sister in the community. She had served for 71 years and would outlive her younger sister Catherine by nearly five years.

Catherine Lauth was born on her brother John's 10th birthday, on January 1, 1851. She immigrated to America in September of 1872, arriving at New York with a large group of seventeen, led by Fr. Peter. Fr. Sorin had started his own Novitiate in the Sister's House at Notre Dame that year, and Catherine would enter as postulant in the Fall. She received the habit at Notre Dame du Lac on February 2, 1873; two years later in August she made her profession

in Brownson Hall at the convent chapel. She was given the name Sr. Susanna. Immediately following her profession, she began her work of setting type by hand and reading proofs for the printing presses of the Ave Maria Press at Notre Dame, no doubt under the tutelage of Brother Stanislaus. Sr. Susanna worked alongside Rev. Daniel Hudson, newly appointed editor of the Ave, for the next 54 years. After 15 years of service, in 1890, she was promoted to the charge position in the Ave printing office. Of all the Lauth siblings, she lived a relatively undocumented life, and yet her steady contribution to the Ave Maria Press would be a substantial ministry of support for the Mission of the Holy Cross. She moved permanently to St. Mary's where she lived in the infirmary for two years until her death on August 7th, 1932.

Michael Lauth was the last child born to Michael and Margaret on May 28, 1856. In 1872, he left Luxembourg with his brother Peter and sister Catherine, arriving at Notre Dame in September. At age 16, he enrolled as a student and postulant. The following year he studied at Sacred Heart College in Watertown, WI. In letters to Fr. Granger in 1873, Fr. John described his brother's disposition as "very quiet, reserved and somewhat timid", and asked that he remain

in Watertown with him to finish the term. At Notre Dame the next year, Michael participated in the choir, the coronet band, and was assistant teacher of piano for four years. He joined the Novitiate and professed to the Congregation in 1875 and 1876, respectively.

In October of 1878, his brother, Fr. Jacob, was defending Michael's honor in letters to Fr. Sorin against rumors circulating about him, involving a conflict between him and another at Notre Dame. Following the great fire in April of 1879, the Local Council met on June 6th to discuss Michael's presentation for ordination, and decided not to advance him.

When Michael learned of the rumors against him, he left for Watertown, WI to take counsel with his brother, Fr. John. While there, he wrote to Fr. Granger and agreed that one, but only one of these accusations against him was true, that he did disobey his order to sing in the church. He defended his prior six years of service and commitment as one who had shown proof of diligence to the call of his vocation. Michael refused Fr. Granger's offer for him to remain in the order but move to Canada, stating that the congregation would think he was either a drunkard or going for immoral reasons that he and Fr. Granger both knew not to be true. He fought for his vocation, and asked to be allowed to remain at Watertown to prove his merit as others had done. He

seems to have succeeded; two years later, on November 30th, 1881, he was ordained a Holy Cross priest by Bishop Elder in the Cincinnati Cathedral, surrounded by his Luxembourgish friends Fr. Hurth and Mr. Johannes.<sup>129</sup>

A week following his ordination, he celebrated his first mass on the feast of the Immaculate Conception at St. Vincent's Elkhart, IN. Fr. Sorin was invited to attend. Most likely the only sibling in attendance was his older sister, Boniface, newly assigned there. Fr. Michael returned to St. Joseph's in Cincinnati as professor for the next year and a half.

Linguistically gifted, Fr. Michael taught himself Polish for his new assignment as assistant pastor to St. Hedwig's parish in South Bend, IN. He preached his first Polish homily on March 31, 1883; two weeks later, the church of St. Hedwig's was dedicated. For the next three years, he served the parish as well as the outlying congregation of St. Stanislaus in Terre Coupee, IN, and found time to translate into Polish some articles and stories of famous composers, sent to Fr. Hudson for printing by the Ave Maria press.

In May of 1886, Fr. Michael was assigned to St. Stanislaus Parish in Pittsburgh, PA where he served through 1887. By September of 1888, he was on his way to Austin as assistant to his brother Fr. Peter Lauth at St. Mary's Cathedral, and new chaplain at St. Mary's Academy. This assignment lasted till he was called back to Notre Dame in June of 1892, as Professor of German Literature at the college. In October, he formed a "mission band" in Holy Cross with Fr. Klein, and by mid November, the two preached their first week-long Mission to the Catholic residents of South Bend at Sacred Heart Church. His tenure as Professor lasted till the end of the 1895 academic year, at which time he returned to Austin to serve with Fr. Peter for the next three years. Alongside Fr. Klein, he preached missions in Austin, Liberty, and Beaumont, Texas. Fr. Michael would join the faculty at St. Edwards as Professor of Theology for the 1897- 1898 academic year.

Midway through the spring term at St. Edwards, the newly appointed provincial, Rev. John Zahm, arrived in Austin. Fr. Michael Lauth was released from the Congregation just one month later on May 5th, 1898 for unknown reasons. Outside the congregation, Rev. Michael found employment at the parish of St. Mary's in Appleton, WI, Chicago, and Peru, IL. 143

Nothing further is known of him, except that he was buried on May 5th, 1908 in Calvary Cemetery in Milwaukee, as "Michael Lauth."

While not pursuing a religious vocation, another Lauth brother, John Peter, was born on October 20th, 1843 in Bous. This fourth oldest brother attended Notre Dame from 1863 to 1867, before moving back to Chicago. When the Luxembourger mutual aid society of Chicago incorporated in 1872, he was voted as President of the Society. He started a preparatory school in Chicago on N Clark St., and was voted High Master in the Catholic order of Foresters in Chicago. He was prominent in local Catholic and city events, and made many trips to Notre Dame, giving speeches and attending graduations. His generosity helped purchase the stations of the Cross as well as the frescoing for the old Church of Loretto. Though not a member of the congregation, John Peter Lauth was buried in the community Cemetery in April 1917, the burial site marked by its largest tombstone.

The tombstones standing peacefully in the community cemeteries at Notre Dame and St. Marys are physical reminders of a loyal family who left home to spend their life in service together for Holy Cross and its pioneering efforts in America. Through their recruitment trips to the Grand Duchy, the Lauth brothers opened the door for many Luxembourgers to come to the new world and follow that mission path. Their pioneering efforts helped forge a Catholic culture on new
